The new rules are laid out in an international regulation known as the CACPP (Convention on the Control of Plant Protection Products). The European Commission is in the process of drawing up a detailed document to be signed at the beginning of 2003. But the new rules, to come into force by 2007, will see it tougher than ever before. The European Commission has tightened the control of the CACPP by coming up with various new measures to improve the way it operates. The move has been welcomed by the European agriculture industry, but it has drawn criticism from Britain, which is believed to be among the leading nations breeding agricultural and horticultural pests. One of the key changes the CACPP will introduce is that new packaging or labelling must clearly identify the products as pesticides, and must also contain warnings about the risks to the environment and human health. Products which are currently banned but will not be included in the new system are fertilisers, seeds, pesticides and soil fungicides. Opponents say the move will unfairly hit those who have developed markets for their products in developing countries. They say the system could be construed as protectionism and not in line with its role as a promoter of free trade. According to the European Commission, more than 150 million tonnes of pesticides and fungicides are sold every year. It says around 10 million tonnes are used in Europe alone. A key demand of the developing countries has been that international regulation should include a ban on the sale of pesticides not approved by internationally recognised procedures.
